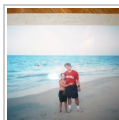

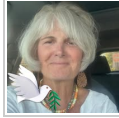
Sorry to hear of David's passing. Worked with David for over 22 years. He was a great co-worker and supervisor. He will be missed. My condolences to his family.
