When I was in high school, I participated in drama and music. There were parts in plays that required many lines to memorize, and there Mom would be, running lines with me while at the ironing board. Definitely a multi-tasker, she was, even before it was a popular behavior.

Need a last-minute batch of cookies for the school bake sale? Mom would make it happen. Have a homework assignment to finish?

Mom would give whatever help she could. For years I kept a scrapbook of leaves that she and I collected in the forest preserves near Chicago. It was a science project for elementary school. She carefully pressed each one we collected between pieces of waxed paper to ready them for mounting on colored construction paper.

Ah, another image of her at the ironing board.

Life events separated us as I grew up, got married, and became independent. I stayed in Arizona where our family had moved when I was ten. Mom moved back to Chicago. There were visits, of course. I flew there with a 9-month old Michael, her first grandchild. She came here to see her granddaughter, Darra, get married. We cooked for the wedding reception, and Mom and Joe, my stepdad, were right there in the church kitchen to help. Other visits during the years in between sustained us.

The last few years of her life, we enjoyed marathon phone calls every two weeks. It became a standing appointment when she would share what was going on in her life. Nurturing--she was still at it. Bringing food to neighbors who were too infirm to cook for themselves. Driving friends to run errands until she could no longer

drive. She was a woman who lived to help other people. Many will miss her, but we will remember, fondly, all that she did for us.
