“ Our dad was an amazing man and I'd like to share his incredible story. He grew up in a very poor family in China, the youngest of five children. At times, food was so scarce that he ate insects for protein. He knew leaving China would offer greater opportunities for himself, his family, and future children so he, with his friend, risked their lives to swim across the 4km bay into Hong Kong around the age of 25. The waters were dangerous, but he still attempted the journey at the risk of drowning or being shot by Chinese soldiers. He made it to Hong Kong and worked in a factory making umbrellas but would later fly to America to find better work so he could send more money to his parents. He came here with little money, no belongings, no high school education, and no knowledge of English. Through hard work and dedication he worked his way up from a restaurant dishwasher to head chef. He raised a family of three boys, provided us with anything we asked for, and eventually opened and operated his own restaurant. He taught my two brothers and me the value of hard work and dedication. We are very fortunate for all that he's done for us.
